The CHAIRMAN. The hearing will come to order, please.

This morning we have a hearing and, will hopefully, be able to send out the nomination of Thomas B. Wells as a judge on the U.S. Tax Court. Mr. Wells is here today with his wife, Mary Jo, and with Senator Mattingly who is going to introduce him.

And, Senator, if you and Mr. Wells are ready, we are ready to

start.

STATEMENT OF HON. MACK MATTINGLY, A U.S. SENATOR FROM THE STATE OF GEORGIA

Senator MATTINGLY. Thank you very much, Mr. Chairman, and other members of the committee. It is really a pleasure for me to appear before the committee to participate in the introduction of Mr. Thomas B. Wells, who has been nominated to be a judge of the U.S. Tax Court.

Mr. Wells is one of the outstanding tax lawyers in the State of Georgia and it is without hesitation I recommend him to you both

here today.

Tom Wells has distinguished himself both academically and professionally. He holds an undergraduate degree from Miami of Ohio, and later received his law degree from Emory University in Atlan-

Following several years of law practice, Mr. Wells earned a masters of law degree in taxation from New York University, which is generally recognized throughout the country as one of the best

graduate tax programs available.

Tom Wells has been really an active and well respected tax practitioner in the city of Atlanta since 1978. He has a present affiliation as a senior partner in the professional corporation of Shearer & Wells. He is involved also in the leadership activities of various bar organizations and has served as director of both the Atlanta Estate Planning Council and the North Atlanta Tax Council. He is also active in numerous civic business and neighborhood organizations.

Mr. Chairman, and distinguished ranking member of the committee, I believe Tom Wells is exactly the type of individual we need on the bench of the U.S. Tax Court. He has outstanding professional qualifications. He is a man of excellent integrity and character and he possesses the necessary judicial temperament for the position.

So I come before you today and recommend him very highly. And I am very happy to introduce him to probably the two most distinguished leaders on Capitol Hill, Tom, so you have gotten the double barrel here this morning from two of the most esteemed

Senators on Capitol Hill.

The CHAIRMAN. We don't normally ask him difficult questions until after he is on the court, and he has made some decision that we don't like. Then we bring him back and say, why did you make that tomfool decision? How did you come to that conclusion when our intent was so clear? And, of course, anyone who looks at the current tax bill knows that it is a model of absolute clarity and everyone can understand exactly what it is. [Laughter.]

Senator MATTINGLY. That's right.

The Chairman. I would expect no provision would ever reach the Tax Court.

Senator MATTINGLY. This new tax bill will be full of mirrors.

[Laughter.]

The CHAIRMAN. Senator Long.

Senator Long. Let me just ask you about your background a

little bit, Mr. Wells.

I see here that you attended New York University. What did you do, while you were practicing law you went back and specialized in and took a course in tax law?

STATEMENT OF THOMAS B. WELLS

Mr. Wells. Yes, sir.

Senator Long. Were you practicing much tax law prior to that time?

Mr. Wells. Yes, sir.

Senator Long. So since you were practicing tax law quite a bit, you decided you ought to specialize in it. Was that the idea?

Mr. Wells. That's right.

Senator Long. I see.

The CHAIRMAN. Russell, I might add that I went to New York University Law School undergraduate. They have had their graduate tax law school for almost 40 years now. It is very common for people to practice, 2, 3, or 4 years in tax, and then go for a year to New York University Law School and get a masters of tax law.

Senator Long. I am aware of that, Mr. Chairman.

Now, let me ask you, did they give you any grades there or just teach you some courses at New York University Law School?

Mr. Wells. They give you grades, sir. Senator Long. Where do you stand in your class? Mr. Wells. I don't believe they ranked the classes.

Senator Long. They didn't rank them. Well, what kind of grades did they give you?

Mr. Wells. Good grades. [Laughter.]

Senator Long. I didn't ask for that sort of a vague answer. I assume you passed. Could you be a little more definite about that? Was it A's, B's, or what, 3.1 out of a possible 4.0? What grades were they?

Mr. Wells. My grades were around 3.0. Senator Long. Out of a possible 4.0?

Mr. Wells. Out of 4.0, yes, sir.

Senator Long. I see. Well, that is good enough. [Laughter.]

That will qualify you.

Now Senator Packwood touched on this subject and it has been a matter of bewilderment to me. If a person is really qualified for the job as a practitioner, I keep wondering why would he take it. I would assume that you are making a great deal more money out there in private practice than you will make in this job. Is that correct?

Mr. WELLS. Yes, sir.

Senator Long. Could you give me some relationship? I don't need an exact figure. But I mean in relative terms, what this job pays? About what percentage of what you will make here out of what you were making before?

Mr. Wells. It depends on how good a year our law firm has had,

Senator.

Senator Long. Well, compared to your last year, let's say.

Mr. Wells. It is probably 60 to 80 percent, somewhere near that. Senator Long. Well, you will take a very substantial pay cut that comes with the job.

Mr. Wells. Yes, sir.

Senator Long. And you don't have the prospects or increases that you would get if you were out there in private practice either.

Mr. Wells. That is right, sir.

Senator Long. Now I have been constantly dismayed about the fact that Senators don't have the guts to vote themselves a pay raise and it hurts everybody else in Government. I won't say everybody. It hurts people like you. It hurts the district judges, it hurts the top officers in the military, people in a similar place, position, in Government.

Have you made your plans to live on substantially less income

than you have been making in private practice?

Mr. Wells. Yes, sir.

Senator Long. Your wife understands that? [Laughter.]

Mr. Wells. She raised her eyebrows. [Laughter.]

Senator Long. Well, it seems to me though people would under-

stand that when they go into this job.

Well, with that understanding, I am willing to vote for you to take the job. If you want to do it, I am willing to give you the opportunity, and wish you luck in it, Mr. Wells.

Mr. Wells. Thank you, Senator. I consider it a great challenge and a good opportunity for me to practice tax law. Thank you, sir.

The CHAIRMAN. I want to note for the record that the nominee has filed all appropriate financial disclosure statements which the committee has reviewed and found them to be in order.

Senator Baucus.

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Senator Baucus. No questions. Thank you, Mr. Chairman.

The CHAIRMAN. Mr. Wells, I have no questions.

Your record really was exemplary. The FBI brought it in a couple of days ago. You have many, many, many laudatory comments. You are above repute with everyone who commented on you and you are to be congratulated.

Mr. Wells. Thank you, sir. The Chairman. Thank you.

Mary Jo, it is good to have you with us.

Mr. Wells. I appreciate that, sir.

The CHAIRMAN. Thank you.

We will stand in recess until 10 o'clock when we will start on the trade bill. And I hope we will be able to send out Mr. Wells' nomination.
