OPENING STATEMENT OF HON. MAX BAUCUS, A U.S. SENATOR FROM
 MONTANA, CHAIRMAN, COMMITTEE ON FINANCE

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4 The Chairman. The business before the committee is 5 to organize for the 113th Congress. To organize, we have 6 several things we must do: (1) adopt rules of procedure; 7 (2) adopt a committee budget resolution; (3) assign 8 Senators to subcommittees; and (4) designate certain 9 Senators to serve on several panels whose members are 10 drawn from members of this committee.

The committee will also consider three nominees: 11 12 Jacob Lew to be Secretary of Treasury; Christopher Meade, 13 to be General Counsel for Department of Treasury; and 14 William Schultz, to be General Counsel for the Department 15 of Health and Human Services. I encourage Senators to submit any statements they wish for the record, but at 16 17 this point would recognize any Senators who wish to make any statements with respect to the nominees. If not, we 18 19 will proceed with next steps.

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OPENING STATEMENT OF HON. ORRIN G. HATCH, A U.S. SENATOR
 FROM UTAH

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4 Senator Hatch. Well, let me first second--now that 5 we have a quorum--my colleague's suggestions here.

The Chairman. Thank you, Senator.

7 Senator Hatch. In addition to the budget hearing, 8 I also want to take a few minutes to comment on the committee's consideration of the nomination of Jack Lew 9 10 to be Secretary of the Treasury. At the outset, let me 11 say that I intend to vote today in favor of Mr. Lew's 12 confirmation. I believe the President is owed a fair 13 amount of deference in choosing people to work in his 14 administration. Though I would have chosen a different 15 person for this particular post, I intend to defer to President Obama with regard to the Lew nomination. 16

That said, I do have serious reservations regarding Mr. Lew. I like him personally very much. He certainly has a lot of experience in this town. But I have reservations regarding Mr. Lew that have not been assuaged through the committee's consideration of this appointment.

In the end, I hope that he will prove me wrong. For example, I strongly disagree with Mr. Lew on some significant policy issues, most notably his decision to

backtrack from the administration's previous position on
 the need for entitlement reform and his belief in the
 need for higher taxes.

4 Ultimately, I hope we end up with the Jack Lew of 5 the Clinton administration, not just another acolyte of б the Obama White House. I hope we get a Treasury 7 Secretary willing to work with the other side of the 8 aisle to put our Nation first in order to confront the challenges facing us today. If Mr. Lew is that kind of 9 10 Treasury Secretary, then I think we can work together to 11 accomplish some great things for our great country.

But if Mr. Lew is committed to playing the same partisan games that have gone on for the better part of the last four years, then we are going to have serious difficulties in getting anything done. I hope that will not be the case.

In addition, as my questions during the hearing demonstrated, I believe that Mr. Lew has been less than forthcoming about his time at Citigroup and NYU. Indeed, after extensive questioning, we still know very little about these areas of his record. This is problematic, and I plan to go into these concerns more fully when the nomination is debated on the floor.

Furthermore, I am deeply concerned about the general lack of responsiveness from the Obama administration to

legitimate questions that I and other members of this 1 2 committee have asked. Sometimes we get no answers at 3 all, and that is entirely unacceptable, as I have said 4 all too many times from this very spot.

5 Mr. Chairman, I expect the committee will report the Lew nomination today and, once again, I intend to vote in 6 7 favor of doing so. However, as I stated, I have 8 significant concerns that I hope will be addressed by 9 greater responsiveness and transparency from the administration. I hope you will continue to work with me 10 11 to address these concerns, and I believe you will because of our relationship. I want to thank you, Mr. Chairman, 12 13 for the work that you do.

Thank you, Senator. The Chairman.

15 I will now turn to committee organization, unless Senators wish to make statements now with respect to any 16 of the nominees. 17

18 Senator Grassley. I would like to.

19 The Chairman. All right. Senator Grassley?

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OPENING STATEMENT OF HON. CHUCK GRASSLEY, A U.S. SENATOR
 FROM IOWA

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4 Senator Grassley. Yes. I do not care whether you 5 have a roll call vote or not, but I want to be recorded 6 as voting "no" on all three nominees, and this is my 7 reason.

8 I will start with Mr. Schultz. I like and respect 9 Mr. Schultz, and I also appreciate that HHS is trying to 10 address my concerns. However, until I receive answers to 11 my letters and document requests from FDA, I am hesitant 12 to support or agree to any movement on this nomination.

As for Mr. Meade, I wrote him asking him to clarify his views on interpretation of the statutes. I look forward to Mr. Meade's response, but until my concerns are addressed I cannot support the nomination.

Finally, Mr. Lew. First, I am concerned about the 17 18 attitude of this administration and its supporters who 19 criticize the Senate, usually anonymously, for exercising 20 basic due diligence regarding this nominee. They do not 21 like anyone questioning them and they do not like 22 answering questions. Despite their tactics, we must 23 continue to perform the Senate's vital role of advice and 24 consent.

What we have seen so far is that Mr. Lew is very

good at getting paid by taxpayer-supported institutions.
Citigroup received a taxpayer-funded bail-out and gave
Mr. Lew a piece of it on his way out the door. Taxexempt New York University paid Mr. Lew an over \$900,000
salary, paid his mortgage, and paid him a substantial
\$685,000 severance payment. The reasons for the
severance payment are still unclear.

8 The amount was first reported in a New York Times 9 article which called it "unusual." This must be further 10 examined. It is a shame that Mr. Lew failed to understand 11 these details as part of his confirmation process, 12 leaving us to rely on the press to dig out the details.

13 Mr. Lew's eagerness and skill in obtaining bonuses, 14 severance payments, and perks raise questions about 15 whether he appreciates who pays the bill. In fact, when 16 asked basic questions like, what interest did you pay on 17 your \$1.4 million mortgage, Mr. Lew could not remember. 18 Of course, that answer does not pass the laugh test.

When asked about communications with Citigroup regarding student loan kick-backs, he responded that he could not remember any. Then he and the administration made it clear that they had no intention of providing documents that might refresh his recollection and shed light on whether he was involved in those kick-backs. Clearly, these questions do not matter to them

because they think they have the votes, but transparency and sunlight are essential for Congress and for the American people. If Mr. Lew will not answer our questions now, why should we on this committee expect him to answer any questions if he is confirmed? That is unacceptable. For these reasons, I will vote "no" on that nomination. The Chairman. Are there any other Senators who wish to speak on any of the nominees? Senator Roberts?

OPENING STATEMENT OF HON. PAT ROBERTS, A U.S. SENATOR
 FROM KANSAS

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Thank you, Mr. Chairman. 4 Senator Roberts. This is 5 in regard to the nomination of Jack Lew. His response to my question last week regarding general aviation and then 6 7 the written comments to questions that I submitted were 8 informative, but at the same time very troubling, to me. He confirmed a couple of key points that I have been 9 10 making since there has been quite a campaign of unfair 11 attacks on the industry.

12 Let me just point out once again that general aviation is used in the normal course of business. 13 It is 14 not a fat-cat corporate jet with Oscar-winning Hollywood 15 folks aboard. That may be true in some cases, but not a They are used to increase efficiency, to make 16 lot. personnel more productive, and to facilitate key 17 18 functions of the companies and firms that use general 19 aviation aircraft.

Now, when we wrote a question and asked for his written response to my questions on general aviation, he responded by saying "these aircraft are not always used by top executives but by lower level employees such as myself when I flew on the Citicorp corporate jets." Well, if we have an attack on general aviation, or

1 at least that is one of the people in the barrel around 2 here, and then we have the nominee saying, well, they are 3 just used by top executives but I happened to fly on 4 them, I think that is a little disingenuous.

5 Basically, I also hope that Mr. Lew will work with 6 us on comprehensive tax reform. Basically, the very 7 important topic to me is of great importance about 8 regulatory implementation. We had a discussion with Mr. 9 Lew, and then I raised the question when he was here 10 before us.

11 Treasury and many of the departments implementing 12 the Affordable Care Act have often referred to 13 subregulatory guidance documents, such as bulletins, 14 quidance, postings on the website, FAQs, to demonstrate 15 that they are really letting all the providers and the stakeholders know what is happening with regards to 16 This is not working. This raises several 17 regulations. 18 concerns, as subregulatory guidance does not hold the 19 force of law. It generally does not reach to the same 20 notification and other means, the same amount of 21 stakeholder participation, and is outside the traditional 22 regulatory process.

Now, this can really confound stakeholders and
providers with limited resources, both time and money, on
where they should place their focus. They do not know

what is going on, do not know where to go get help, and
 all of a sudden they are guilty until proven innocent.

3 The traditional regulatory process, as described in 4 both statute and executive order, calls for notice, 5 comment, review, and consideration of comments and then 6 issuing a final rule, not a bunch of IFRs, interim final 7 rules, or sub-regulatory means of informing the 8 stakeholder. So, I am very hopeful that we can make some 9 progress on that.

I just did not feel that Mr. Lew really focused on that to the degree that this problem demands in regards to attention. So I hope we can work with him once he is confirmed, but I do have these concerns, and I will be voting "no." Thank you.

The Chairman. Thank you, Senator.

16 Are there any other Senators who wish to make any 17 statements?

With no further debate and without 17 18 objection, the assignments are made. 19 [No response.] 20 The Chairman. Next, is to designate Finance Committee members on the Joint Committee on Taxation, on 21 22 the Congressional Oversight Group, as Congressional Trade 23 Advisory on Trade Policy and Negotiations. By statute 24 and tradition, the committee designates its most senior 25 five Senators to fill these roles, and that is the

1 designation proposed in the papers before every Senator. 2 Senator Hatch. I so move again. 3 The Chairman. Fine. Good. That is done. The 4 designations are made. 5 We will now consider the pending nominees. The б first nomination for the committee to consider is Jacob 7 Lew, nominated to be Secretary of Treasury. If there is 8 no further debate, I will entertain a motion that the committee report the nomination. 9 10 Senator Hatch. We are going to need a roll call 11 vote on all three, on each one of them. 12 The Chairman. All right. A roll call vote has 13 been requested.
