Since I have the honor to refer further to a letter from the assistant clerk of your committee, dated the 6th ultimo, transmitting a bill (S. 5909) to extend to Jackson-ville, Fla., the privileges of the first section of the act approved June 10, 1880, entitled "An act to amend the statutes in relation to immediate transportation of dutiable goods, and for other purposes," wherein the request was made that your committee be furnished with such suggestions as may be deemed proper concerning the merits of the bill and the propriety of its passage.
