OPENING STATEMENT OF HON. RON WYDEN, A U.S. SENATOR FROM
 OREGON, CHAIRMAN, COMMITTEE ON FINANCE

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4 The Chairman. The Finance Committee will come to 5 order. The Finance Committee meets today to consider 6 the nomination of Chris Magnus to be Commissioner of 7 U.S. Customs and Border Protection.

8 Senator Crapo and I have been talking in 9 considerable detail about how to proceed this morning 10 because so many of our colleagues have hearings and 11 business. Many committees are conducting business. So 12 after consultation with the ranking member, my friend 13 Senator Crapo, we have agreed on how we are going to 14 proceed.

We are going to use the time to make statements about the nomination. I will make a short statement. Senator Crapo will make a short statement. There may be other colleagues who wish to make statements as well.

At that point, the Finance Committee will recess until 11:30 when the committee will reconvene in the President's Room off the Senate Floor to have the vote. So I will offer a statement now with respect to Mr. Magnus, and then my friend Senator Crapo will offer his statement.

25 As noted, we are going to vote today on the

nomination of Chief Chris Magnus to lead Customs and
 Border Protection. I believe it is clear that Chief
 Magnus is highly qualified for what I think all sides - we can have some differences of opinion around here - but I think all sides can say this is a difficult job.

6 Chief Magnus is a highly respected law enforcement 7 leader, the Chief of Police in Tucson, AZ, a major 8 population center near our southern border. So, he has 9 valuable hands-on first-hand experience dealing with the 10 immigration challenges that are central to this job. 11 And it is clear to me that he is committed to strong 12 enforcement of our country's immigration laws.

13 Second, Chief Magnus has also committed to us that 14 the Customs and trade aspect of the agency, the work 15 that is so important there, is not going to get short 16 shrift on his watch. This has been an issue that has 17 plaqued Customs and Border Patrol in the past, so it is 18 important to get the Customs mission done right. And 19 because the pandemic has thrown supply chains into 20 disarray and caused major headaches for businesses and 21 consumers, this is a matter that Senators hear about day 22 in and day out, because it is urgent business for the 23 people we have the honor to represent.

24 Chief Magnus told us he will ensure that the ports 25 have the Customs staffing that they need, and the chief

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wants to improve their efficiency in a way that

2 maintains safety as well. The chief has also committed 3 to enforcing the United States ban on products that are 4 made with forced labor, to help ensure the products are 5 stopped at the border and never enter the U.S. market.

6 This is certainly a big challenge, but modern-day 7 slavery is an affront to American values and is, in my 8 view, the worst kind of unfair trade practice. Chief 9 Magnus understands that this is an area where the United States cannot budge. The United States cannot 10 11 compromise. These are priorities for this committee, 12 and I particularly want to commend our colleague from 13 Ohio, Senator Brown, who has been such a leader on these 14 forced labor issues, and I would be glad to partner with 15 him.

Finally, it is clear to me that Chief Magnus is going to handle this job with hard work and bring a real sense of decency to this task. He shares that he has been enforcing our immigration laws and treating people humanely, but with two priorities that are not mutually exclusive. We can do both, and I believe Chief Magnus will do that.

He has a record of bringing people together. He is pragmatic. He is committed to transparency, and he is stepping up to take the job, as he told us. He wants to

make a difference. He is the right choice, and he
 deserves strong support.

Certainly, we have members who have strong views on that. We are going to be here, should any members wish to come in. I intend to support Chief Magnus's nomination, and I hope that members of the committee will do the same. Senator Crapo?

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OPENING STATEMENT OF HON. MIKE CRAPO, A U.S. SENATOR
 FROM IDAHO

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Senator Crapo. Thank you, Mr. Chairman. We are
here, as you indicated, to vote on the nomination of
Christopher Magnus to be Commissioner of the U.S.
Customs and Border Protection.

8 I intend to oppose this nomination. As I said 9 during the nominee's hearing, CBP's responsibilities are 10 staggering under the best of circumstances. But the 11 present is not the best of circumstances, not while CBP 12 faces an unprecedented border crisis.

13 This fiscal year ended with 1.7 million 14 apprehensions on the southern border, the highest on 15 record. Tragically, but not surprisingly, it also led 16 to another record -- the highest annual number of 17 migrant deaths, 557 dead trying to cross our borders.

18 While our brave men and women of the Border Patrol do everything they can to address this tragedy, criminal 19 20 cartels are using the opportunity to move more drugs 21 than ever across the southern border. This year alone, 22 the Border Patrol seized over 390 kilograms of fentanyl. 23 Consider that number next to this one: one kilogram of 24 fentanyl has the potential to kill 500,000 people. 25 Plainly put, communities around the country, including

those in Idaho that are far from the southern border,
 are suffering because of the ongoing crisis unfolding at
 our southern border.

I cannot understand why the administration refuses to call this the crisis that it is, other than to avoid taking responsibility and committing the requisite resources to address it.

8 The nominee was asked by members of this committee 9 multiple times to acknowledge that we face a crisis. He 10 declined to do so. Although I will not be voting in 11 favor of Mr. Magnus's nomination today, I believe we do 12 share common concerns, including combating the 13 importation of goods made with forced labor and 14 enforcing our trade remedy laws. If confirmed, I will 15 work with Mr. Magnus to address these and other issues 16 in a bipartisan manner.

Mr. Chairman, thank you for holding this markuptoday.

19 The Chairman. Thank you, Senator Crapo, and we will 20 continue to work together on these issues. And, as we 21 talked about yesterday, we have a whole host of areas of 22 bipartisan opportunity, and I think we have already seen 23 the members on both sides of the aisle be very 24 interested in some of the issues like mental health, 25 savings, and the like. So, we are going to be working

1 together on a variety of issues.

2	And given that, I do not see any additional
3	colleagues on either the Democratic or the Republican
4	side. The Finance Committee is going to recess until
5	11:30 a.m. and reconvene at that time in S-216. With
6	that, the committee is adjourned.
