OPENING STATEMENT OF HON. MIKE CRAPO, A U.S. SENATOR
 FROM IDAHO, CHAIRMAN, COMMITTEE ON FINANCE

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4 The Chairman. The committee will come to order. 5 We meet today to consider favorably reporting the 6 nomination of Congressman Billy Long to be Commissioner 7 of the Internal Revenue Service. As we have done with 8 other nominees, the meeting this morning will provide 9 members with the opportunity to offer remarks on 10 Congressman Long's nomination.

11 We will then recess briefly following member 12 statements, and then proceed to this morning's 13 nominations hearing. We will notify members of a time 14 and a location later today to conduct the vote on 15 Congressman Long's nomination.

At his hearing, Congressman Long outlined his 16 17 vision to transform the IRS through systems 18 modernization, a renewed focus on efficiency, and a 19 much-needed change in IRS culture. If confirmed, I look 20 forward to working with him to ensure the IRS focuses on 21 helping American taxpayers to better understand and meet 22 their tax responsibilities, and that it enforces the tax 23 law with integrity and fairness to all.

I was encouraged to hear Congressman Long clearly commit that "the IRS will not and should not be

politicized on my watch." I also would like to thank Congressman Long for his time working through the Finance Committee's rigorous nomination process, in addition to responding to a large amount of questions for the record.

6 At his hearing and in his written responses, 7 Congressman Long clearly affirmed that all of his tax 8 consulting work was as an independent contractor for 9 Capital Edge strategies. He never performed work for 10 White River or anyone else regarding Native American 11 Tribal tax credits.

12 With respect to the contributions to his Senate 13 campaign, Congressman Long stated time and again that he 14 followed Federal Election Commission guidelines. In 15 sum, Congressman Long is uniquely suited to instill 16 needed change at the IRS, and I will vote in favor of 17 his nomination. I encourage my colleagues on both sides 18 of the aisle to do the same.

I now recognize Ranking Member Wyden for his
 remarks.

OPENING STATEMENT OF HON. RON WYDEN, A U.S. SENATOR FROM
 OREGON

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Senator Wyden. Thank you very much, Mr. Chairman.
Over the last several years, I have heard every
member of this committee, all the Democrats, all the
Republicans, talk about the importance of independence
and neutrality at the IRS. If you genuinely believe in
those priorities, you cannot vote for Billy Long's
nomination for IRS Commissioner.

Here is what is known about Congressman Long. He was not on the Ways and Means Committee. He wrote no original tax legislation in 12 years in the Congress. He has no tax policy experience, but he's got lots of tax fraud experience.

When he left office, he threw in with a bunch of fly-by-night operators selling tax deals that were sketchy at best. He was paid to promote fake Tribal tax credits by a company called White River -- excuse me -- White River Energy.

After White River's scheme got exposed as a fraud in a *Bloomberg* report in mid-December, the company's CFO reassured panicky investors that everything would work out. They would soon have friends at the IRS under Donald Trump to take the heat off. He said he would be

able to use his contacts to obtain favors and special private rulings. We've got this on tape. The CFO and several other White River employees then started making big-dollar donations to Congressman Long's Senate campaign that had been mothballed all the way back to 2022.

7 More than \$165,000 came into the campaign after 8 Trump announced Long's nomination. Much of it was from 9 people affiliated with White River. Mr. Long pocketed \$130,000 of that himself. Now he has repeatedly been 10 11 asked to explain his role in the scheme I have 12 described. What did he know about these fake tax 13 credits? Who did he talk to about them? Why did White 14 River employees think it was a good idea to donate to 15 his dormant campaign?

None of those questions were answered. Finance Committee investigators obtained information from the IRS that these Tribal tax credits Congressman Long helped sell were indeed fake, and the promoters could face prosecution. Staff read that confirmation aloud to Congressman Long last month.

He became outraged. He demanded to know who at the IRS had provided that information to the Finance Committee. He said he would find out immediately if he gets confirmed. If his involvement in that one tax scam

1 was not enough, there is more.

He was slinging employee retention tax credits long after they had technically expired. When a well-meaning rescue program for small businesses had been overrun by fraudsters, Congressman Long is on tape saying that everybody qualifies for the employee retention tax credit. That is a lie.

8 He bragged about getting money for a funeral home, 9 even though the pandemic was a boom time for that kind 10 of business, due to the number of Americans dying of 11 COVID-19. Finance Committee investigators obtained 12 another recording, this time of an executive in a firm 13 called Appreciation Financial, that sold these tax 14 scam-ridden tax credits.

He said he made Congressman Long his guest to the inauguration earlier this year. He said they had dinner and spent a few nights together. His exact quote on the subject of IRS enforcement around employee retention credits is this. "We could be worried," and I quote here, "about promoter audits. Now we do not have to worry about any of that now with Billy coming in."

Echoing the executive at White River, the second tax credit promoter said he had been promised special favors by Congressman Long himself. Again, we've got it on tape. I have not even mentioned Congressman Long's

multiple letters urging politically motivated attacks
 against nonprofit organizations.

That, colleagues, is going to be the opposite of neutrality and independence that Democrats and Republicans talk about here in the committee. The fact is these scandals I am mentioning are too big to ignore, and, colleagues, I know for a fact that there is going to be more troubling information that comes to light.

9 So, I close with this. It is not too late to go 10 back and find somebody who is not surrounded by scandal, 11 who's got the experience managing a large organization, 12 who's got some real experience working on tax policy. 13 What is needed in our country now more than ever is an 14 independent IRS.

For that reason, I strongly oppose the Long nomination, and I am going to urge all my colleagues to do the same.

18 Thank you, Senator Crapo.

19 The Chairman. Thank you, Senator Wyden.

20 Normally I would turn to any other Senator who is 21 interested in making a statement, but seeing none, 22 unless there is objection, we will proceed to a recess 23 briefly before the hearing that is scheduled for 10:30 24 for other nominees.

25 And we will vote off of the floor at a time to be

1 agreed. Is there objection?

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2	Senator Wyden. There is not. I just want to make
3	sure, so all colleagues understand. We will go to the
4	regular hearing at 10:30, 45 minutes from now?
5	The Chairman. That is correct.
6	Senator Wyden. Thank you.
7	The Chairman. With that, the committee stands in
8	recess.
9	[Whereupon, at 9:40 a.m., the meeting was
10	recessed.]
