The Committee on Finance, to whom was referred the resolution (S. Res. 238) directing the United States Tariff Commission to conduct an investigation on all pins classified under paragraph 350 of the tariff act of 1930, having considered the same, report it to the Senate with the recommendation that it do pass.

My Dear Senator Smoot: In compliance with the request contained in your letter of June 17, the commission has given consideration to the proposed S. Res. 238 directing the commission to investigate all pins classified under paragraph 350 of the tariff act of 1930.

The commission has no comments or suggestions to make with respect to this resolution. The statistics as reported for 1931 show imports under this paragraph of hair pins, valued at \$12,401; safety pins, valued at \$56,157; and "other" pins, valued at \$172,618.
