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## **RELATION OF DUTIES TO VALUE OF IMPORTS**

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**A Comparison of the Equivalent Ad Valorem of Rates of Duty in 1929 and in the Period October, 1930, to September, 1931, on Articles Dutiable Under Both or Either of the Tariff Acts of 1922 and 1930**

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### **SUMMARY OF REPORT**

This report compares the average ad valorem equivalent of duties in 1929 under the act of 1922 and in the year ended September 30, 1931, under the act of 1930.

In 1929 the total value of imports of articles which were at that time dutiable, together with imports of articles transferred from the free to the dutiable list by the act of 1930, was \$1,658,100,000. The duties collected on these imports amounted to \$584,271,000, the average ratio of duty to value, designated as the ad valorem equivalent, being thus 35.2 per cent in 1929. The value of the same articles imported in the year 1930-31, including some which had been transferred from the dutiable to the free list by the act of 1930, amounted to \$758,455,000, and the duties thereon totaled \$373,868,000, or an average of 49.3 per cent. This latter figure has, however, been materially affected by the decline in prices, and when the 1930-31 values are adjusted to the price level of 1929, the average equivalent of the duties becomes about 41.5 per cent.

Apart from any changes in the rates of duty fixed by law and apart from transfers from the free to the dutiable list, and vice versa, the average ad valorem equivalent of the duties collected on actual imports may change between one period and another as the result of two causes. In the first place, changes in the prices of individual commodities may exercise an important influence on articles subject to specific duty. A specific duty is fixed at a given sum per pound, yard, or other unit of quantity, and if the price falls the duty will represent a higher percentage of the value. Price changes also affect in less marked degree compound duties, which consist in part of a specific and in part of an ad valorem rate—a given percentage of the value. In the second place, the average ad valorem equivalent is affected by variations in the relative importance of the commodities imported. If there is an increase in the imports of articles bearing relatively high rates, and no change or a decrease in the imports of those bearing lower rates, the average ad valorem equivalent on total imports will tend to rise, and the opposite will occur if the relative movements are in the reverse direction.

The importance of these two factors in affecting the average ad valorem equivalent is illustrated by comparison between the years 1923 and 1929. Both these years were under the same tariff act and only minor changes in the rates of duty had been made in the interval

by presidential proclamation. Yet the average ad valorem equivalent on dutiable imports rose from 36.2 per cent in 1923 to 40.1 per cent in 1929 by reason of changes in prices and in relative importance of the commodities imported. This 1929 figure is not to be confused with that given above (35.2 per cent), which includes articles dutiable under either the tariff act of 1922 or that of 1930.

In the comparison between 1929 and 1930-31 the commission has undertaken to make an adjustment for the first of these factors, namely, the decline in prices. It has made no such adjustment for shifts in the relative importance of commodities, since the primary purpose of the report is to compare the average rates on the actual imports; and for this reason the comparison should not be taken as a direct measure of the relative height of duties under the acts of 1922 and 1930. A previous report of the commission issued in 1930 makes such a direct comparison between the two acts by applying the rates of each to the same quantities and values of imports, namely, those of 1928.

As an aid to interpreting the comparison between 1929 and 1930-31, the commission has introduced certain groupings of the dutiable commodities, thus giving a more complete picture than has heretofore been presented. The report distinguishes, in the first place, between articles subject to the different forms of duty—specific, ad valorem, compound, and miscellaneous. It further distinguishes, as to articles subject to each form of duty, between those on which the 1930 rates were the same as, higher than, or lower than the 1922 rates.

#### Effect of the fall in prices on duties.

In estimating what would have been the average ad valorem equivalent of the duties in 1930-31 if the prices of commodities had remained the same as in 1929, adjustment is made only for price changes on articles subject to specific duty. This, however, furnishes a sufficient basis for approximately correct conclusions concerning the effect of the fall in prices on the ad valorem equivalent for all dutiable imports. No adjustment, of course, is required for articles subject to ad valorem duty, since the percentage which the duty forms of the value remains the same whatever the price. The group of articles at compound rates, in which price changes exercise some influence on the average ad valorem equivalent, is of very minor importance.

The results of this calculation are as follows:

For articles subject to specific duty—that is, articles so dutiable under both the act of 1922 and the act of 1930, or at a specific rate under one of these acts and free under the other—the actual average ad valorem equivalent of the duties was 36.5 per cent in 1929 and 58.4 per cent in 1930-31. However, when the prices of 1929 are applied to these 1930-31 imports the value is raised 37 per cent, and using this adjusted value as a divisor the average ad valorem equivalent of the duties at specific rates falls to 42.6 per cent. On imports subject to all other forms of duty, taken together, the actual ad valorem equivalent in 1930-31 was 40.7 per cent. Combining these two averages, 42.6 per cent and 40.7 per cent, with weights according to the relative importance of these two great groups, the commission finds an adjusted average ad valorem equivalent for all imports in 1930-31 at about 41.5 per cent, which is comparable with the figure of 35.2 per cent for 1929.

A further evidence of the important effect of the recent decline in prices upon the average ad valorem equivalent is furnished by the statistics for that group of articles subject to specific duty on which the rates for each commodity were precisely the same under the act of 1922 and the act of 1930. For this group the average ad valorem equivalent in 1929 was 25.5 per cent, and if there had been no change in prices it would probably have been about the same in 1930-31, whereas the actual figure for the later year was 33.5 per cent.

#### Average ad valorem equivalents for the fifteen individual schedules.

The following table makes a comparison, as to each of the 15 schedules of the dutiable list, of the average ad valorem equivalent for all articles dutiable under both acts or dutiable under one act and free under the other, no adjustment being made for the decline in prices:

The changes shown by this comparison are due only in part to increases or decreases in the actual rates of duty under the new tariff act. They are also affected by the decline in price levels and by shifts in the relative importance of the commodities imported.

An approximate adjustment for the decline in prices has been made by the commission for 8 of the 15 schedules, where that decline has had considerable influence on the average ad valorem equivalent. (See pp. 18, 21.) This factor has been particularly important in the case of Schedules 5, 7, and 11.

Schedule 5 (sugar, molasses, and manufactures thereof) consists chiefly of specific rates. The average ad valorem equivalent for the entire schedule in 1929 was 84 per cent and in 1930-31 it was 132.4 per cent, but when the 1929 prices are applied to the imports of 1930-31 the average falls to about 91 per cent.

Schedule 7 (agricultural products and provisions) also consists very largely of specific duties. The ad valorem equivalent for the schedule was 19 per cent in 1929 and 37.7 per cent in 1930-31, but when an adjustment is made to the basis of 1929 prices the average for the year 1930-31 becomes about 28.3 per cent.

In Schedule 11 (wool and manufactures thereof) only about one-third of the imports are at specific rates, but this third consists chiefly of raw wool, and the price of raw wool has fallen greatly, thus affecting in a marked degree the totals for the entire schedule. The unadjusted ad valorem equivalent for the schedule in 1930-31 was 72.7 per cent. When, however, the 1929 prices are applied to the 1930-31 imports of

articles subject to specific duty, the average for the entire schedule falls to about 62.8 per cent as compared with 50.8 per cent in 1929.

#### Articles dutiable under each tariff.

In addition to the comparisons above mentioned, which relate not only to articles dutiable under both tariffs but to those dutiable under one tariff and free under the other, the comparison is made of the average ad valorem equivalent as between articles actually dutiable in 1929 and those actually dutiable in 1930-31, disregarding shifts from the free to the dutiable list and vice versa. The average for the former year was 40.1 per cent and for the latter, 51.2 per cent. In this comparison there is no adjustment for the decline in prices.

#### INTRODUCTION

This report was prepared by the Tariff Commission in response to requests for information with respect to the ad valorem equivalent of duties collected on imports since the passage of the tariff act of 1930 as compared with a given period preceding that act.

The compilation of official statistics showing the total value of imports of dutiable commodities and the total amount of duties thereon, from which the average ad valorem equivalent rate of duty can be directly computed, is a simple matter. The Tariff Commission has in the past shown such statistics for each year under the several tariff acts. (See Table 6, page 13 for statistics covering the years 1891 to February 29, 1932.) The mere presentation of these averages, however, affords no explanation of changes that have occurred. For an understanding of the underlying reasons for these changes as between two different periods, especially periods covered by different tariff acts, the averages must be analyzed.

With a view to furnishing such an analysis for two periods, one prior to and one subsequent to the tariff act of 1930, the commission began an investigation late in 1931, using as a base imports in 1929 under the act of 1922 (modified in some cases by changes in rates by presidential proclamation) as compared with imports for the 12-month period ended September, 1931. The year 1929 was the last complete calendar year under the tariff act of 1922. The period ended September 30, 1931, was chosen as being as more representative than the period ended June 30, 1931, for the reason that the imports for some months following a new tariff act are likely to be abnormal.

Apart from actual changes in the rates of duty on individual commodities, including transfers from free to dutiable and vice versa, two other factors may bring about changes in the average ad valorem equivalent of duties on actual imports, namely (a) changes in the average unit prices of individual commodities subject to specific or compound duties, and (b) changes in the relative importance of commodities imported at the several rates of duty. It is obvious that a specific rate of duty—so much per pound or per yard—will become a higher percentage of the value of the article if the price of it falls and a lower percentage if the price rises. The same is true of compound duties consisting in part of a specific and in part of an ad valorem levy, though the effect of the change in prices will not be so great as with articles subject to specific duty.

As to the second point, (b) it is evident that if there is an increase in the imports of articles bearing higher rates, and no change or a

decrease, or a less marked increase, in the imports of those bearing lower rates of duty, the average ad valorem equivalent on total imports will tend to rise, while the opposite will occur if the change in the relative importance of the commodities is in the reverse direction.

The importance of these two factors in affecting the average ad valorem equivalent is illustrated by the changes in that equivalent from year to year, even under the same tariff act. For example, under the tariff act of 1922 the equivalent ad valorem on dutiable imports rose from 36.2 per cent in 1923 to 40.1 per cent in 1929.<sup>1</sup>

Both of these factors, in addition to the changes in rates of duty brought about by the tariff act of 1930, affect the comparison of the average ad valorem equivalent during 1929 and 1930-31. Because of the great change in the general economic situation of the United States and of the world between these two periods, prices declined sharply, causing a corresponding increase in the ad valorem equivalent of many specific and compound duties. This change in the general business situation also tended to bring about shifts in the nature of our imports.

As an aid to interpreting the comparison of the two periods, 1929 and 1930-31, the commission has introduced certain groupings of dutiable commodities: (1) A distinction is made between articles subject to the different forms of duty, and (2) imports are subdivided to show separately, for articles subject to each of the three principal forms of duty, those on which the rates under the act of 1930 were the same as, higher than, or lower than the rates under the act of 1922. As far as possible, also, the commission has attempted to measure the effect of price changes on the ad valorem equivalent.

It is important to distinguish between the different types of duty because the average ad valorem equivalent for each type is differently affected by price changes. Distinguishing between articles on which the rates under the two acts were unchanged, increased, or decreased, facilitates interpretation of the effect both of price changes and of shifts in the relative importance of commodities imported at different rates. It is evident, for example, that for the group of articles subject to specific rates which were the same in 1930-31 as in 1929, any change in the average ad valorem equivalent must have been due either to price changes or to shifts in the relative importance of commodities. On the other hand, for the group of articles subject to ad valorem rates of duty which were the same in 1930-31 as in 1929, any change in the average ad valorem equivalent must be due to a shift in the relative importance of the individual articles in the import trade, inasmuch as the change in price of an article dutiable at an ad valorem rate does not affect the ad valorem equivalent.

Although the methods of analysis used in the accompanying tables facilitate interpretation of the changes in the average ad valorem equivalent of duties, they do not furnish a means of direct measurement of the relative height of duties under the last two tariff acts. The only way in which the effect both of price changes and of shifts in the relative importance of imports at different rates can be eliminated in a comparison of tariffs is to apply the rates under the different acts to the same quantities and values of imports. Such a comparison was made in a publication issued by the Tariff Commission shortly

after the enactment of the tariff of 1930, in which the rates of the act of 1922 (modified in some cases by presidential proclamation) and those of the act of 1930 were multiplied into the imports of 1928. For convenience, a summary of this comparison is presented in Table 8. (See p. 23.)

The totals given in the top line of Table 1 comprise all articles dutiable under either act, including those transferred from the dutiable to the free list, or from the free to the dutiable list, by the act of 1930. On the basis of imports in 1929 the average ad valorem equivalent on all these articles was 35.2 per cent; the corresponding average on the articles imported in 1930-31 was 49.3 per cent. As shown more fully below, the latter percentage would have been materially lower had there been no fall in prices compared with 1929.

Considering only articles subject to the same form of duty in both acts, the average rose from 41.3 to 63.2 per cent on articles subject to a specific duty, from 36 to 38.5 per cent on articles subject to an ad valorem duty, and from 56.2 to 60.4 per cent on articles subject to a compound duty.

The effect of the decline in prices upon the average ad valorem equivalent for articles subject to specific duties is shown clearly by the figures in this table relating to imports of articles dutiable at specific rates which were the same under both acts. For this group the average ad valorem equivalent in 1929 was 25.5 per cent as compared with 33.5 per cent in 1930-31; it is entirely possible that the whole of this increase may have been due to the decline in prices, since such shift as has occurred in the relative importance of the individual articles may have tended toward a reduction in the average ad valorem equivalent. By reason of the fall in prices, the group of specific-duty articles on which the rates were lower in 1930-31 than in 1929 shows only a slightly lower average ad valorem equivalent in the later year.

The group of imports designated "miscellaneous" in Table 1 comprises products on which the form of duty was changed as between the two tariff acts, and also items subject to various special forms of duty, such as specific with ad valorem minimum, specific with ad valorem maximum, ad valorem with specific minimum or maximum, and compound with minimum or maximum, together with sundry items in which the definitions were so changed by the act of 1930 that no comparison of the value of imports or the amount of duties on the particular item can be made article by article.

Table 1 also shows totals in which are combined articles dutiable at specific, ad valorem, and compound rates, respectively, under both acts and those which were free in 1929 and dutiable under the three forms, respectively, in 1930-31, or vice versa. The last two lines of the table afford a comparison of the rates during the two periods on the articles actually dutiable under the act of 1922, and a similar comparison for those actually dutiable under the act of 1930, disregarding transfers from free to dutiable and vice versa.

Table 2, based on Table 1, shows in the first two columns the relative importance of the imports falling under the several groups distinguished. It shows for example that, of the total imports in 1929 of articles subject to duty either under the act of 1922 or the act of 1930, 43.9 per cent in value consisted of articles subject to specific rates of duty under both acts, as compared with 44.5 per cent of the total in 1930-31.<sup>2</sup> The table also shows a percentage distribution based on the amount of duties; for example, articles subject to specific duty under both acts accounted for 51.3 per cent of the duties in 1929 and 57 per cent in 1930-31.

#### Increase or decrease in value of imports and in amount of duties.

Table 3, derived from Table 1, shows for each group of articles distinguished the amount by which the value of imports and the duties collected increased or decreased in 1930-31 as compared with 1929, together with the ratio of the value of imports and the amount of duties collected in 1930-31 to the corresponding figure for 1929.

This table shows, for example, that on articles dutiable under both acts at specific rates, where no change was made in the rates of duty by the act of 1930, the value of imports in 1930-31 was \$117,420,000 less than in 1929 (\$159,525,000 compared with \$276,945,000, as shown in Table 1). The duties collected on articles of this group decreased by \$17,208,000. The value of the imports of these articles in 1930-31

was 58 per cent of the corresponding value in 1929, that is, there was a decrease of 42 per cent. The duties collected in 1930-31, however, amounted to 76 per cent of the duties collected in 1929, the decrease being 24 per cent.

#### Articles dutiable under each act.

In addition to the comparisons between 1929 and 1930-31 which cover articles dutiable under either act (including those dutiable under both acts and those transferred from free to dutiable or vice versa), Table 1 shows (at the bottom) a comparison between the two years for articles which were dutiable under the act of 1922, not including those then free, and another comparison for articles dutiable under the act of 1930, not including those then free. On articles dutiable under the act of 1922 the average ad valorem equivalent rose from 40.1 per cent in 1929 to 51.5 per cent in 1930-31; whereas on articles dutiable under the act of 1930 the comparative averages were 35.8 and 51.2 per cent,

respectively. The difference between the increases shown by these two comparisons is due to the fact that the value of imports of items transferred from the free to the dutiable list by the act of 1930 was greater than that of the transfers from dutiable to free.

If comparison is made directly between articles imported in 1929 and dutiable under the act of 1922 and those imported in 1930-31 and dutiable under the act of 1930, including of course some articles in each year omitted from the comparison in the other, the average ad valorem equivalent rises from 40.1 to 51.2 per cent. (See Table 5.)

#### Relation of values of dutiable goods and of duties to total value of imports.

The present report deals largely with dutiable imports and duties thereon. Table 4, on the other hand, deals with total imports in 1929 and 1930-31, including those free of duty.

Table 4 shows that of the imports in 1929 a little less than two-thirds, 66.4 per cent, were free of duty, whereas in 1930-31 duty-free imports constituted a little more than two-thirds, 67.7 per cent. The difference between these two percentages is not a measure of the effect of transfers from the free to the dutiable list and vice versa, the relationship of the two being materially affected by shifts in the relative importance of individual commodities in the import trade and in their unit prices. Data with regard to transfers from free to dutiable and from dutiable to free are given in Table 1, page 7.

The duties collected represented 13.6 per cent of the total value of free and dutiable imports in 1929, the corresponding figure for 1930-31 being 16.5 per cent.

#### Forms of duty in relation to imports under each act.

The classification of imports according to forms of duty shown in Table 1 is for commodities dutiable under both acts or under either act. It is also significant to compare the relative importance of the different forms of duty under each act separately as shown in Table 5. In 1929 imports at specific rates constituted 52 per cent of the total value of imports then dutiable; whereas in 1930-31 imports at specific rates constituted 48.6 per cent of the total value of imports dutiable at that time. It should be noted that differences in the relative importance of the several forms of duty as between the two years

may be due not merely to changes in the tariff act (changes in the form of duty or transfers from the free list to a given form of duty and vice versa) but also to shifts in the relative importance of individual commodities in the import trade and to differences in price changes.

#### Free and dutiable imports and duties collected, by years, 1891–1932.

Table 6 shows for each year since 1891 (for the year 1930 distinguishing the periods before and after the passage of the tariff act) the value of free and dutiable imports, the amount of duties collected, and the corresponding equivalent average ad valorem on dutiable imports and on all imports. The various factors affecting these ad valorem equivalents, as well as those affecting the ratio between free and dutiable imports, have already been discussed. The data for the calendar year 1931 show slightly different ratios from those for the period ended September 30, 1931, as given in Table 4, page 11.

<sup>1</sup> Preliminary data.**Effect of price changes on ad valorem equivalents.**

*For various forms of duty.*—As already stated, price changes affect the ad valorem equivalent of duties principally for articles dutiable at specific or compound rates. The commission has undertaken to estimate approximately for specific-duty articles what would have been the average ad valorem equivalent in 1930-31 had the prices remained the same as in 1929. This could be done with some approach to accuracy. It was not practicable to make a corresponding adjustment for articles subject to compound duties or to ad valorem duties. The absence of any adjustment in the latter group is of little importance, as previously explained, although the change in prices may have affected somewhat the shifts in the relative importance of commodities in the imports. For articles subject to compound duties, it would have been desirable, if possible, to make an adjustment for the decline in prices, although the effect of that decline has, of course, been less for such articles than for those subject to specific duty, and although the compound-duty group is one of much smaller magnitude than either of the other two major groups. (See Table 2, p. 9.)

The difference, with respect to the feasibility of price adjustment, as between articles subject to the different forms of duty may be explained by the nature of the commodities concerned. A large proportion of the articles at specific rates are of a simple and definite character—such items as wool of a specified grade, jute burlaps, and sugar of a specified polarization. Consequently, the average price

of one year can be directly compared with that of another year. On the other hand, for articles subject to ad valorem and compound duties, many of the tariff items are in the nature of basket clauses comprising a variety of products, and many others relate to advanced manufactures mixed in grade and type. Because of the many non-standardized commodities, import statistics often show no quantities whatever, and even where quantities are given the variations in composition from year to year are often such that the average unit prices are not comparable. Furthermore, changes made in the tariff classification by the act of 1930 preclude price comparison for a large number of commodities at ad valorem and compound rates.

*Price adjustments for articles subject to specific rates of duty.*—Table 1 shows combined totals for articles subject to specific duty under both the act of 1922 and the act of 1930 and articles subject to specific duty under one of these acts and free under the other. The average ad valorem equivalent on these specific-duty articles in 1929 was 36.5 per cent and in 1930-31, 58.4 per cent. The method of adjusting this comparison to eliminate as far as possible the effect of the decline in prices was as follows:

Comparable unit prices were found to be available for articles representing about seven-eighths of the total value of all imports at specific rates. For these articles the average ad valorem equivalent in 1929 was 37.5 per cent (as compared with 36.5 per cent for all articles at specific rates). The actual average ad valorem equivalent of the duties on the same articles in 1930-31 was 61.4 per cent. When, however, the prices of 1929 are compared with those of 1930-31, it appears that they averaged 37 per cent higher in the earlier year. Increasing the value of the 1930-31 imports by 37 per cent, and using this adjusted value as a divisor, the average ad valorem equivalent of the duties falls from 61.4 per cent to 44.8 per cent. This adjusted average is equal to about 73 per cent of the unadjusted average.

This ratio between the adjusted average for 1930-31 and the unadjusted average, as derived from the commodities for which price comparison was possible, was used in adjusting the average ad valorem equivalent on all specific-duty articles. By this adjustment the average for 1930-31 falls from 58.4 per cent to 42.6 per cent. In other words, had there been no change in prices the average ad valorem equivalent of the specific duties would have been approximately 42.6 per cent in 1930-31, as compared with 36.5 per cent in 1929.

*Combination of adjusted figures for specific duties with figures for other forms of duty.*—In the absence of data by which the average ad valorem equivalent for articles subject to ad valorem and compound rates can be computed on the basis of unchanged prices, an approximation of the effect of the decline in prices on the average ad valorem equivalent for total dutiable imports may be reached by combining the adjusted figures for specific-duty articles with unadjusted figures for all other articles. The resulting averages present a fairly correct picture, since, for reasons already set forth, very nearly all of the total influence of price changes upon the average ad valorem equivalent is exerted through the specific duties.

As already stated, the average ad valorem equivalent in 1930-31 for articles subject to specific rates, when adjusted to 1929 prices, was about 42.6 per cent. On imports subject to all other forms of

duty, taken together, the actual average ad valorem equivalent was 40.7 per cent. These two percentages may be combined into a general average by giving to each a weight corresponding to the value of imports in 1930-31—namely, \$368,011,000 for articles subject to specific duties and \$390,444,000 for all other articles. The resulting figure, representing approximately what would have been the average rate on all imports in 1930-31 at 1929 prices, is 41.6 per cent, as against the actual average ad valorem equivalent in that year of 49.3 per cent. The average for 1929, as already stated, was 35.2 per cent.

The previous report published by the commission, in which the rates under the two acts were applied to the imports of 1928, showed for the act of 1922 (as adjusted in some cases by presidential proclamation) an average ad valorem equivalent of 33.2 per cent and for the act of 1930 an average of 40 per cent. (See Table 8, p. 23.)

#### COMPARATIVE AVERAGE AD VALOREM EQUIVALENTS FOR INDIVIDUAL SCHEDULES

##### Summary.

Table 7 shows for each of the 15 tariff schedules the imports of items dutiable under either or both acts, the duties and the average ad valorem equivalent, in 1929 and in 1930-31. For comparison there are shown the average ad valorem equivalents as ascertained by applying the rates under the acts of 1922 and 1930 to the imports of 1928. (Taken from Table 8, p. 23.)

Wide variations may be noted among the several schedules in the relation between the average ad valorem equivalent for 1930-31 and that for 1929. These variations are due not only to differences with respect to tariff changes (including transfers from free to dutiable and vice versa) but also to differences with respect to the relative effect of price changes and of shifts in the importance of imports of commodities at different levels of duty. The effect of price changes is particularly great for those schedules where there is a preponderance of specific rates. A clearer understanding of the factors affecting the comparison for the several schedules may be gained from the more detailed analysis in Table 9. (See pp. 26-37.)

**Effect of the decline in prices on the average ad valorem equivalent for certain individual schedules.**

For a considerable number of tariff schedules, where a large proportion of the imports are subject to specific duties, the commission has undertaken to analyze the effect of the decline in prices between 1929 and 1930-31 in the same manner as was done for total imports. The results are set forth below.

*Schedule 1. Chemicals, oils, and paints.*—About three-fifths of the imports under this schedule in 1930-31 were at specific rates, including articles free in 1930-31 but at specific rates in 1929. Comparable prices for 1929 and 1930-31 were available for about 97 per cent of these specific-duty articles.—The actual ad valorem equivalent for all specific-duty articles in 1930-31 was 29.3 per cent, but when adjusted to the basis of 1929 prices the average becomes 24.1 per cent as compared with 25.2 per cent for specific-duty articles in 1929. The average ad valorem equivalent for articles subject to other forms of duty was 34.5 per cent in 1929 and 33.6 per cent in 1930-31. The weighted average ad valorem equivalent for all imports in 1930-31, based on the adjusted figure for specific-duty articles and the actual figure for all other articles, was 27.7 per cent, as compared with 28.9 per cent in 1929. This decline in the average ad valorem equivalent is apparently due chiefly to shifts in the relative importance of different commodities. In a previous publication of the commission the rates in the act of 1922 and in the act of 1930 were multiplied into the same quantities and values of imports, those for 1928, whereby an increase from 29.2 to 31.4 per cent appeared.

*Schedule 2. Earths, earthenware, and glassware.*—About 30 per cent of the imports under this schedule in 1930-31 were at specific rates, including articles free in 1930-31 but at specific rates in 1929. For somewhat over three-fourths of these specific-duty articles a calculation of the value of imports in 1930-31 on the basis of the average unit prices of the imports of 1929 was made by the commission. It should be noted, however, that in some cases there is considerable doubt as to the close comparability of the items and for this reason, as well as because of the large number of articles for which no price adjustment is possible, the adjusted figures must be considered only as rough approximations.

The actual ad valorem equivalent for all specific-duty articles in 1930-31 was 38.8 per cent. Adjusted by the method stated to the basis of 1929 prices, the average becomes 36.4 per cent as compared with 36.7 per cent in 1929. The average ad valorem equivalent for articles subject to other forms of duty was 51.1 per cent in 1929 and 57.2 per cent in 1930-31. The weighted average ad valorem equivalent for all imports in 1930-31, based on the adjusted figures for specific duty articles and the actual figure for all other articles, was 51.0 per cent as compared with 46.9 per cent in 1929. These figures may be compared with those, presented in a previous publication of the commission, obtained by multiplying the rates of the 1922 act and the 1930 act, respectively, into the same quantities and values of imports (for 1928), which shows an increase from 45.6 per cent to 53.6 per cent.

*Schedule 5. Sugar, molasses, and manufactures thereof.*—Nearly 99 per cent of the imports under this schedule in both 1929 and 1930-31 were at specific rates and the great bulk (about 90 per cent) in both

years consisted of sugar. Sugar and other articles imported from Cuba take a duty 20 per cent less than the general rate, and if there had been between 1929 and 1930-31 a marked increase or decrease in the proportion of the total imports under this schedule coming from Cuba, it would have affected materially the comparability of the average ad valorem equivalent. As a matter of fact there was relatively little change in this respect, more than 95 per cent of the total imports under this schedule in both years having come from Cuba. Comparable prices for the two years were available for nearly the entire total of imports under the schedule.

The actual ad valorem equivalent for all specific-duty articles in 1930-31 was 133.6 per cent, but when the value of the imports of sugar and other commodities is adjusted to the basis of 1929 prices the average becomes 101.2 per cent, as compared with 84.3 per cent in 1929. The average ad valorem equivalent for the small volume of imports of articles subject to other forms of duty was 40.2 per cent in 1929 and 40.3 per cent in 1930-31. The weighted average ad valorem equivalent for all imports in 1930-31, based on the adjusted figure for specific-duty articles and the actual figure for all other articles, was 90.7 per cent, as compared with 84.0 per cent in 1929. These figures may be compared with those in a previous publication of the commission in which the rates of the 1922 act and the 1930 act were applied to the same quantities and values of imports, those for 1928, giving average ad valorem equivalents of 67.9 per cent and 77.2 per cent, respectively. The fact that both these figures are lower than that shown above for 1929 is due to the decline in prices of sugar between 1928 and 1929.

*Schedule 6. Tobacco and manufactures thereof.*—About 95 per cent of the imports under this schedule in both 1929 and 1930-31 were at specific rates (including articles free in 1930-31 but at specific rates in 1929, or vice versa). Average unit prices at least approximately comparable for the two years were available for practically all the imports at specific rates. The actual ad valorem equivalent for all specific-duty articles in 1930-31 was 68.2 per cent but when adjusted to the basis of 1929 prices the average becomes 62 per cent, as compared with 65.1 per cent for specific-duty articles in 1929. The average ad valorem equivalent for articles subject to other forms of duty was 72.3 per cent in 1930-31. The weighted average ad valorem equivalent for all imports in that year, based on the adjusted figure for specific-duty articles and the actual figure for all other articles, was 62.5 per cent, as compared with 65 per cent in 1929. This decline in the average ad valorem equivalent may be attributed to shifts in the relative importance of different commodities. When the rates of the act of 1922 and of the act of 1930 were multiplied into the same quantities and values of imports, those for 1928, in a previous publication of the commission, an increase from 63.1 per cent to 64.8 per cent appeared.

*Schedule 7. Agricultural products and provisions.*—This schedule represents a larger volume of imports at specific rates than any other. The specific-duty imports in 1930-31 constituted over two-thirds of the total imports under this schedule (including articles free in 1930-31 but at specific rates in 1929). Comparable prices for 1929 and 1930-31 were available for about 95 per cent in value of the specific-duty articles.

The actual ad valorem equivalent for all specific-duty articles in 1930-31 was 40.4 per cent, but when adjusted to the basis of 1929 prices the average becomes 28.5 per cent as compared with 18.2 per cent for specific-duty articles in 1929. The average ad valorem equivalent for articles subject to other forms of duty was 21.1 per cent in 1929 and 27.8 per cent in 1930-31. The weighted average ad valorem equivalent for all imports under the schedule in 1930-31, based on the adjusted figure for specific-duty articles and the actual figure for all other articles, was 28.3 per cent, the corresponding average for 1929 being 19 per cent. According to a previous publication of the commission, in which the rates of the act of 1922 and the act of 1930 were multiplied into the same quantities and values of imports, those for 1928, an increase from 19.9 to 33.6 per cent appeared. The less marked increase shown by the present comparison is probably due to shifts in the relative importance of the different commodities imported.

*Schedule 8. Spirits, wines, and other beverages.*—Practically all imports under this schedule are at specific rates. The commission applied the average 1929 unit prices to the imports of 1930-31 for the great bulk of the imports in terms of value, but it is not altogether certain that the commodities under the several paragraphs are closely comparable and consequently uncertain whether the price adjustment closely reflects the true facts. On the face of the figures, the average unit prices were but little lower in 1930-31 than in 1929, so that price adjustment does not materially change the comparison of the average ad valorem equivalent.

Using the same methods as with the other schedules, it appears that the actual ad valorem equivalent on all commodities under the schedule was 29.6 per cent in 1929 and precisely the same in 1930-31, whereas when adjustment is made for the change in prices on articles subject to specific duty the average for 1930-31 becomes 29 per cent. The fact that there was thus a slight decline in the average ad valorem equivalent, after the rates on certain items had been increased by the act of 1930, is due to shifts in the relative importance of different commodities imported. In a previous publication of the commission the rates of the act of 1922 and of the act of 1930 were multiplied into the same quantities and values of imports, those for 1928, and the resulting average ad valorem equivalents were 36.5 per cent and 47.4 per cent, respectively; it should be noted that the first of these figures, 36.5 per cent, was considerably higher than the average actual ad valorem equivalent in 1929.

*Schedule 10. Flax, hemp, jute, and manufactures thereof.*—Nearly three-fifths of the imports under this schedule in 1930-31 were at specific rates. Comparable prices for 1929 and 1930-31 were available for practically all of the specific-duty articles. The actual ad valorem equivalent for all such articles in 1930-31 was 15.2 per cent, but when adjusted to the basis of 1929 prices the average becomes 9 per cent, as compared with 8.7 per cent in 1929. The average ad valorem equivalent for articles subject to other forms of duty was 39.1 per cent in 1929 and 41.1 per cent in 1930-31. The weighted average ad valorem equivalent for all imports in 1930-31, based on the adjusted figure for specific-duty articles and the actual figure for all other articles, was 22.7 per cent, as compared with 18.8 per cent in 1929. This comparison shows a slightly greater increase in the average ad valorem equivalent than was shown in a previous publication of the

commission, wherein the rates of the act of 1922 and of the act of 1930 were multiplied into the same quantities and values of imports, those for 1928 giving an average of 18.2 per cent for the act of 1922 and 19.1 per cent for that of 1930. The difference in the two sets of figures is probably due to shifts in the relative importance of different commodities.

*Schedule 11. Wool and manufactures thereof.*—In all the tables of this report dealing with Schedule 11, carpet wool imported for use in the manufacture of carpets and rugs is excluded, such wool being free of duty when used for that purpose; imports of carpet wool on which duties were actually assessed are included in the calculations.

Only about one-third of the imports under this schedule in 1930-31 were at specific rates (including articles free in 1930-31 but at specific rates in 1929). Comparable prices for 1929 and 1930-31 were available for about nine-tenths of the specific-duty articles. The actual ad valorem equivalent for all specific-duty articles in 1930-31 was 76.3 per cent, but when adjusted to the basis of 1929 prices the average becomes 47.8 per cent, as compared with 41.6 per cent for specific-duty articles in 1929.

The average ad valorem equivalent for articles subject to other forms of duty under this schedule was 59.6 per cent in 1929 and 70.8 per cent in 1930-31. The weighted average ad valorem equivalent for all imports in 1930-31, based on the adjusted figure for specific-duty articles and the actual figure for all other articles, was 62.8 per cent, as compared with 50.8 per cent in 1929. This change is parallel to that shown in a previous publication of the commission, wherein the rates of the act of 1922 and of the act of 1930 were multiplied into the same quantities and values of imports, those for 1928, showing an increase from 49.5 per cent to 59.8 per cent.

*Other schedules.*—For Schedules 3, 4, 9, 12, 13, 14, and 15, it has not been found practicable to adjust the average ad valorem equivalent to take account of the changes in prices. In several of these schedules there are either no articles subject to specific duty or such articles constitute a very small proportion of the total imports. For Schedules 3, 4, and 15, although specific-duty articles are of great importance, comparable prices are available for only a limited proportion of these articles. So far as comparable prices for specific-duty articles under any of these seven schedules are available, the data have been used in making up the general adjustment for all articles set forth on page 2.

#### Comparative ad valorem rates in the tariff acts of 1922 and 1930 based on imports in 1928.

Reference has already been made to the fact that the Tariff Commission in 1930 compiled a comparison of the ad valorem equivalent of rates in the tariff act of 1922 and in the tariff act of 1930. In this comparison the rates of each of these acts were multiplied into the quantities and values of imports for consumption during the calendar year 1928, a method of comparison which avoided any effect from changes in the prices of commodities or from shifts in the relative importance of commodities.

A summary by schedules of this comparison is given in Table 8. The following paragraph from the earlier report of the commission regarding this summary table is here quoted:

The summary \* \* \* covers all items on the dutiable list in either the tariff act of 1922 or the tariff act of 1930. Therefore, there are some free list

items included in the calculations for each act because such items are dutiable in the other act. As a result of this inclusion of some free list items in both calculations the ad valorem equivalent rates of duty for each act as a whole and for particular schedules affected are lower than they would be if the calculations were limited to the dutiable list of each act.

It should be noted that the results of a comparison such as presented in Table 8 will depend somewhat upon the period of time chosen as the basis to which to apply the rates of each act. The relative importance of the various items is never the same in two different years; shifts take place both as the result of differences among commodities in respect to increases and decreases in quantity and of differences among them with respect to increases or decreases in average unit prices. This point is illustrated by comparing the average ad valorem equivalents shown in Table 8 for the act of 1922 on the basis of the imports of 1928 with the average ad valorem equivalents under the same act during 1929 as shown in Table 7. For all articles dutiable under both acts or under either act the rates of 1922, applied to the imports of 1928, show an average ad valorem equivalent of 33.6 per cent; the same rates on the same articles imported during 1929 give an average ad valorem equivalent of 35.2 per cent. If the rates of 1922 were applied to the same articles imported during 1931, a still different general average would no doubt be obtained.

Not only will the average ad valorem equivalent of the rates under any one tariff act appear different when applied to the imports of different years, but the relation between the rates of two acts may appear slightly different, even when both are applied to the same quantities and values, according to the year chosen for the comparison. For example, if the rates of the last two acts were applied to the imports of 1929, or applied to the imports of 1931, the increase in the average ad valorem equivalent under the act of 1930 as compared with the earlier act might appear somewhat greater or less than that shown on the basis of 1928 imports.

**Detailed tables**

Table 9 shows for each schedule the imports and duties classified according to the form of duty, with a distinction, for the principal forms, of articles on which rates were unchanged, increased, and decreased by the tariff act of 1930. The form of the table is the same as that for Table 1.

Table 10 consists of percentages based on Table 9, the value of imports, and the amount of duties under each schedule being distributed among the several forms of duty and other classifications.

Table 11 classifies the imports under each of the two tariff acts separately according to the form of duty, by schedules. It differs from Tables 7 and 9 in that they include, for each year, articles which were free of duty in that year but dutiable in the other year, whereas Table 11 excludes these articles.

Table 12 presents the comparative figures for 1929 and 1930-31 by individual tariff paragraphs. Under each paragraph distinctions with respect to the form of duty and the changes, if any, in rates of duty are set forth. This table, like Tables 7 and 8, includes for each year articles dutiable under either of the two tariff acts.
